MESSAGE FROM THE CHIEF

Clovis Police Department strives to serve the citizens of the community and provide law enforcement services to the highest standard to everyone who comes to our city. The men and women of this organization continued to perform at the highest level; the following information is the highlights of the activity and accomplishments by our agency for the past year.

The department's staffing of personnel averaged 52 sworn officers over the twelve month period. The dispatch center continues to function with an average staff of 14 Telecommunicators handling 134,005 incoming and outgoing calls to the center. A total of 5,144 calls were received through the E-911 lines and 33,670 calls were received by the wire-less (cell phone) 911 system.

In 2016, the department responded to a total of 40,863 calls for service and completed 7,866 incident reports. In 2015, the department responded to 41,092 calls for service and completed 8,157 incident reports. This reflects a -.56% decrease in the calls for service and -3.69% decreases in the number of incident reports from the previous year.


The officers made a total of 2,263 arrests for 2016. Of these arrests, 799 resulted in felony charges. In 2016, we saw an increase in our Indexed Crimes. This includes the categories of Homicide, Rape, Robbery, Aggravated Assault, Burglary, Larceny and Motor Vehicle Thefts. The 2016 Index Crimes increased 22.28% in comparison to 2015.

The Special Operations Unit (SOU) produced a 52% clearance rate for 2016. The SOU was assigned 425 cases in 2016. The Detectives cleared 278 of these cases by arrest or other exceptional means. With the team work of Patrol and Investigations, these numbers are well above the national average. The Major Crimes Unit was activated on four occasions in 2016. These incidents involved two homicides which occurred in Clovis, a kidnapping, and the shooting of a Clovis Police Officer.

The department organized and implemented three community events. Kops-n-Kids Basketball, National Night Out and Kops-n-Kids Christmas. None of these events would have been achievable without the men and women of the Clovis Police Department and the support of the community

Therefore, I want to say "Thank You!" to all the employees for their hard work and dedication to providing ethical and professional policing services to our citizens and community.

IN THE NEWS - 2016

January 14, 2016 – Armed Robbery 700 block of Sheldon Street. Suspects Anthony Baca (33) and Shauntae Byrd (37) were identified, arrested, and charged.

February 20, 2016 – Child Abuse resulting in great bodily harm, 3200 block of Ross Street. Kenneth Pierre (28) arrested and charged.

February 29, 2016 – Armed Robbery 300 block of Kansas Street. Juvenile suspects identified, arrested, and charged.

March 21, 2016 – Armed Robbery, 2221 North Main Street, Dairy Queen. No arrests made.

March 24, 2016 – Burglary/Aggravated Battery, 100 block of Adkins Court. Shane Wilson (26) arrested and charged.

March 31, 2016 – Fatal Motor Vehicle Crash, 1100 block of Sandia Street. Jack Robinson cited.

April 27, 2016 – Kidnapping, 500 block of West 11th Street. Robert Sena (26) arrested and charged with kidnapping and aggravated battery on his victim a 27 year old female whom he had stabbed at least 23 times. Officers arriving on scene treated the female victim's wounds with their newly issued trauma kits, assisting in the saving of her life. Robert Sena has been found guilty and was sentenced to the Department of Corrections.

May 1, 2016 – Homicide, Southland Street, reported at PRMC, 2100 North Martin Luther King Boulevard. Francisco Perez (31) was killed by gunfire on Southland Street. Major Crimes Unit activated. No arrests made.

June 6, 2016 – Aggravated Battery, 200 block of Davis Street. Arron Morrisette (32) attacked a 34 year old female with a knife. Officers arrived on scene, treated the female's victim with issued trauma kits, assisting in saving her life.

June 8, 2016 – SWAT activation Felony Arrest, 500 block of East 16th Street. Aaron Morrisette was arrested and charged in reference to the June 6, 2016 incident after a SWAT call out. Aaron Morrisette has been sentenced to the Department of Corrections.

June 10, 2016 – Homicide, 1000 block of Martin Luther King Boulevard. Ramon Rollins (52) was killed during this incident. Major Crimes Unit activated. The case has been forwarded to the District Attorney's Office for action.

June 13, 2016 – Robbery, 1300 block of Wallace Street. No arrests made.

June 13, 2016 – Aggravated Assault, 1100 block of North Prince Street. Daniel Harrison (35) arrested and charged.

June 18, 2016 – SWAT activation Felony Arrest, 1200 block of Ash Street. Manual Duran (42) arrested and charged.

July 13, 2016 – Trafficking Methamphetamine, Grand and Thornton Streets. 1 pound of methamphetamine recovered from a vehicle after execution of a search warrant. Ramiro Luebano (30) arrested and charged.

July 27, 2016 – Kidnapping, 2100 block of West Grand Avenue. Roy Cavazos (29) arrested and charged.

August 16, 2016 – Aggravated Battery, 6th and Ash Streets. A 32 year old male gunshot wound victim was identified. Victim did not cooperate with investigation. No arrests made.

August 29, 2016 – Assault with Intent to Commit a Violent Felony on a Police Officer, 900 Block of Wallace. Traffic stop conducted on a bicyclist identified as Anthony Baca (34). Baca ran from the Officer, shooting at him as he ran. Officer was struck in the leg by the bullet, and received a grazing wound.

August 31, 2016 - Assault with Intent to Commit a Violent Felony on a Police Officer Suspect Arrested 900 block of Mitchell. Anthony Baca (34) was arrested without incident and has been charged for the August 29th incident.

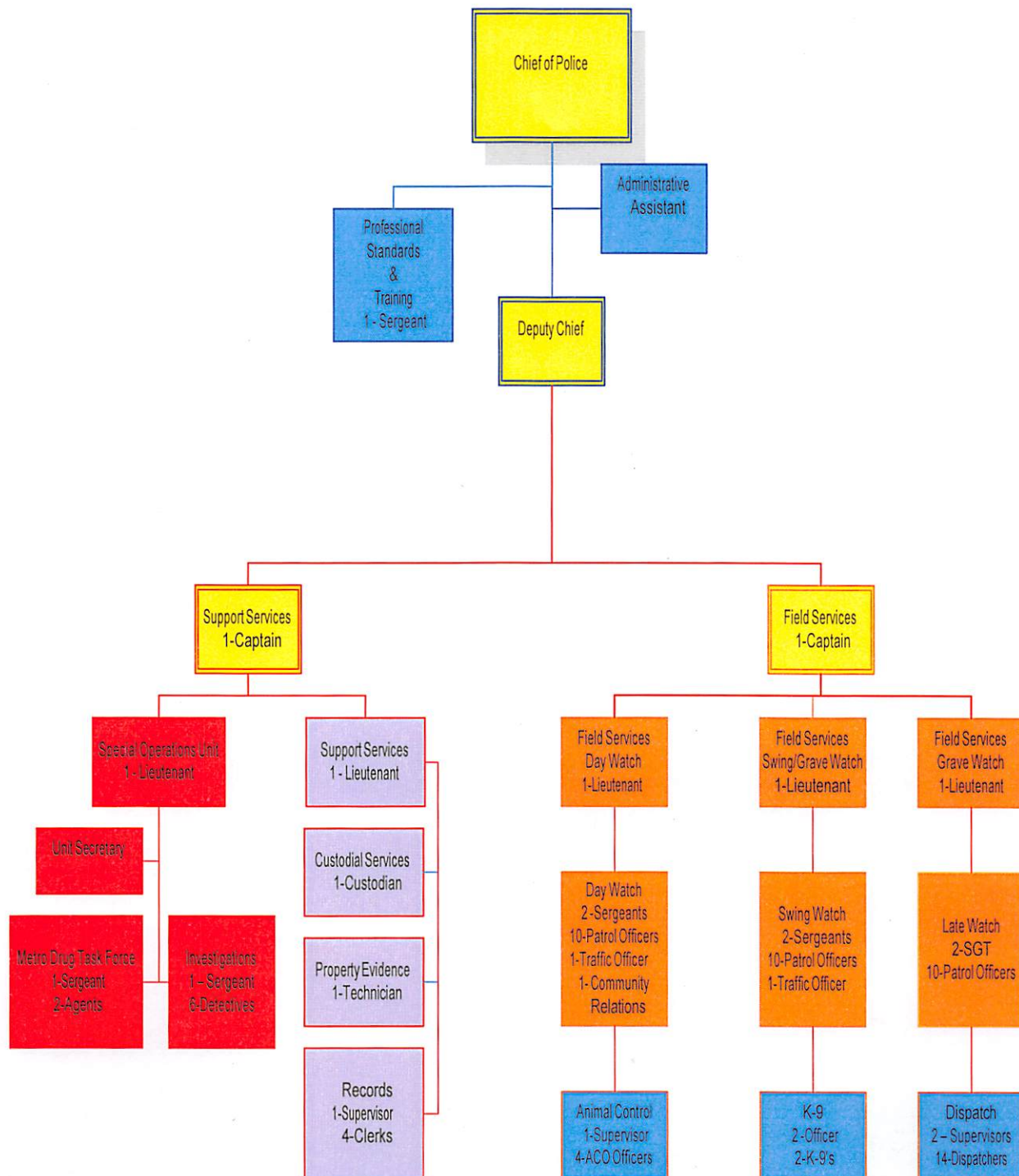
October 18, 2016 – Homicide, 1800 block of East Howard Street. Jimmy Stotts (61) was killed during an argument with his son. Ricky Goodman (42) has been arrested and charged.

October 24, 2016 – Aggravated Battery, 400 block of East 2nd Street. A 25 year old male received a bullet wound to his upper left thigh. Victim refused to cooperate with the investigators. No arrests made.

UNIFORM CRIME REPORTING

The Uniform Crime Reporting Program classifies offenses into two groups, Part I and Part II crimes. Each month, the department submits information on the number of Part I offenses (Crime Index) reported to the Police Department. Those offenses are cleared by arrest or exceptional means, and the age, sex, and race of person(s) arrested. We provide only arrest data for Part II offenses.

The Part I offenses, which comprise the Crime Index because of their seriousness and frequency, are defined below:

Criminal Homicide — Murder and non-negligent manslaughter: The willful (non-negligent) killing of one human being by another. Deaths caused by negligence, attempts to kill, assaults to kill, suicides, and accidental deaths are excluded.

Rape/CSP of Minor — The carnal knowledge of a female/male forcibly and against her/his will. Rapes by force and attempts or assaults to rape, regardless of the age of the victim, are included. Statutory offense (no force used – victim under age of consent) are excluded.

Robbery — The taking, or attempting to take, anything of value from the care, custody, or control of a person or persons by force or threat of force or violence and/or by putting the victim in fear.

Aggravated Assault — An unlawful attack by one person upon another for the purpose of inflicting severe or aggravated bodily injury. This type of assault usually is accompanied by the use of a weapon or by means likely to produce death or great bodily harm. Simple assaults are excluded.

Burglary — The unlawful entry of a structure to commit a felony or a (breaking or entering) theft. Attempted forcible entry is included.

Larceny-Theft — The unlawful taking, carrying, leading, or riding away of (except motor vehicle theft) property from the possession or constructive possession of another. Examples are thefts of bicycles or automobile accessories, shoplifting, pocket-picking, or the stealing of any property or article which is not taken by force and violence or by fraud. Attempted larcenies are included. Embezzlement, confidence games, forgery, worthless checks, etc., are excluded.

UNIFORM CRIME REPORTING

Motor Vehicle Theft — The theft, or attempted theft, of a motor vehicle. A motor vehicle is self-propelled and runs on the surface and not on rails. Motorboats, construction equipment, airplanes, and farming equipment are specifically excluded from this category.

FIELD SERVICES

The Clovis Police Department's Field Services Division is comprised of the Patrol, Dispatch, Traffic and Major Crash Unit, K-9, Gang Unit and Animal Control. There are thirty-five officers and ten supervisors responsible for the day-to-day response to calls for service. While the Animal Control Unit is comprised of four officers and a supervisor.

911 COMMUNICATIONS CENTER

In 2016 the dispatch center was able to add two extra radios. These extra radios and equipment were donated by REDA (Regional Emergency Dispatch Authority). REDA is the communications center located in Artesia, NM. DFA failed to give our funding to us for the 6 year upgrade and some of the communication equipment started to fail. However with the equipment donated to us, we were able to replace failing equipment with newer components. In 2016 a discovery was made that there was not a policy or procedure for dispatchers to follow on keeping their required training up to date. Since then training and recruiting has been tasked with verifying telecommunication operators maintain their certifications. Two telecommunication specialists were hired and will receive certification training in 2017. Stations 5 and 6 were brought online with funding from Homeland Security and donated equipment. At this time both stations 5 and 6 are not working correctly and are in need of maintenance. Six new dispatch chairs were purchased through DFA on a remainder budget from 2015. These chairs were purchased for just over \$7,000 by the City of Clovis and reimbursed by DFA (Department of Finance Administration.)

911 COMMUNICATIONS CENTER

The Dispatch Unit also provides 24 hour communication services for the Melrose Fire, Field Fire, Grady Fire, Broadview Fire, Texaco Fire, Pleasant Hill Fire, and CAFB (Cannon Air Force Base)/ EMS (Emergency Medical Services). The Clovis Police Department Dispatch monitors LEN (Law Enforcement Network)/ State Police Channel, State Fire 1 & 2, the PRMC (Plains Regional Medical Center) Channel, and the State Medical Channel.

The Dispatch Unit answers the emergency (911 Calls) for the county and the non-emergency calls for the Clovis Police Department. The Unit has upgraded to handle wireless 911 calls and has the capability to map incoming wireless (cell phone) 911 calls throughout the county.

In 2016, the unit answered 102,514 inbound calls compared to 145,297 in 2015. Of the 102,514 calls, the Unit answered 5,144 E-911 calls for service compared to 5,790 in 2015. There were 33,670 calls for service which came from the wireless 911 (cell phones) system. The Unit answered 70,128 administrative calls providing a variety of information to the callers compared to 69,750 in 2015.

TRAFFIC UNIT

The Clovis Police Traffic Unit has the responsibility of providing traffic crash investigation, DWI (Driving While Intoxicated) and traffic enforcement. This is done with the use of police cars and motorcycles equipped with Radar and Lidar systems.

Members of the unit have received a variety of very specialized training preparing them to investigate auto and pedestrian traffic crashes. They have received enhanced training in detecting and processing DWI investigations.

The Clovis Police Department wrote a total of 9,270 traffic citations for 2016, while the department investigated 1,231 traffic crashes. Of the 1,231 crashes, 150 of these crashes involved an injury.

The department utilizes a grant from the State of New Mexico to address the traffic and DWI enforcement issues. In 2016, the department arrested 109 drivers for DWI. Of the 109 drivers, 57 drivers were charged with aggravated DWI, while 3 of the drivers were charged with felony DWI. The average breath alcohol level in 2016 is .15 BrAC (Breath Alcohol Content). The legal limit is .08.

The department did investigate a total of 23 crashes in which alcohol was a factor in the collision.

There were 15 blood draws and 23 refusals.

ODWI (Operation DWI) operations arrested-14 and the average age of offender were 34.3.

MAJOR CRASH UNIT

The Clovis Police Major Crash Unit has the responsibility of providing technical traffic accident investigation for major crashes within the city. This is done with the use of laser measuring devices and specialized equipment.

Members of the unit have received a variety of very specialized training preparing them to investigate and reconstruct auto and pedestrian traffic crashes. This allows officers to analyze, evaluate and determine the causation factors associated in the collision. Major Crash Unit Officers prepare reports with visual aids and later present these cases to the courts as expert witnesses.

MAJOR CRASH UNIT

CRASH TEAM ACTIVATIONS:

There were 8 activations for the Clovis Police Department Crash Team and 1 assist during 2016. Of the 9 call outs 4 were fatal crashes. The Team assist was case 16-06468. Team was not called out at the time of the crash; however, electronically measured the scene the following day.

Three new members were added in November to the Crash Team. On the scene training with the new members has been conducted. ARAS training is currently holding 2-3 spots. Discussion of crash investigation class in early 2017 has been conducted.

6. 10-23-2016; 21st/Norris, Case #16-06468-Motorcycle vs. vehicle at intersection. Transported to Lubbock from scene. Major injuries. (Crash Team Assist).
7. 11-24-2016; 21st/Thornton, Case #16-07100, Single vehicle struck utility pole at high speed. Transported to PRMC-deceased.
8. 11-27-2016; 204 Carmel-Case #16-07209, Single ATV crash, transported to Lubbock-survived-pending charges.

K-9 UNIT

The Clovis Police Department currently has one K-9 team, which comprise the K-9 Unit. K-9 Leo is partnered with Master Police Officer Brent Aguilar. B. Aguilar and K9 Leo logged 220.5 training hours with 64 of those hours being scheduled monthly training days.



Having only two K9 teams in the Clovis/Curry County Community, Adlerhorst International pulled Master Instructor Ed Nicks from the Clovis rotation and the Clovis PD K9 team was required to travel to Midland, TX once in 2016 for bi-monthly training.

NEW ORDINANCES:

The Clovis City Commissioners passed the following ordinances that affected the shelters daily functions as follows

- Mandatory spay/neuter on all dogs/cats adopted from the shelter.
- Mandatory micro-chipping on all dogs/cats leaving the shelter.
- Rescue groups that are registered with the city can pull the dogs/cats for free. Animal Control took 3,437 calls for and had 2,164 intakes. There were 417 total animals adopted (down 578 for 2015). There were 308 reclaims (up 4 from 2015). There were 959 animals euthanized during the year (down 70 from 2015).

SOU/Detectives Unit:

The Special Operations Unit has had the continuing privilege to serve our public. In 2016, the Special Operations Unit investigated and solved crimes ranging from Murder, to Burglary cases, Sex Crimes, and White-Collar Crimes. During fiscal year 2016, Detectives were given the opportunity to attend investigative schools. This furthering of education has helped our Detectives create better investigations and interviews, leading to highly prosecutable cases. In addition to this, the Field Evidence Technician program was staffed, appropriately outfitted with higher end cameras, and educated through specialized training. They have become an asset used by SOU for major and minor cases. SOU is currently staffed with 6 Full-Time Detectives and a Detective Lieutenant.

SOU Staffing also includes the majority of the Major Crimes Unit (MCU). The cases noted below were cases that were directly related to the City of Clovis. MCU was also activated on an additional case for a homicide in the county. That case is still active.

The Major Crimes Unit was activated for a kidnapping and assault with intent to commit a violent felony. On June 6, 2016, MCU responded to investigate the vicious stabbing of Jessica Baca by Aaron Morrisette. She sustained life threatening injuries but has recovered. Morrisette was taken into custody following a standoff later that month. Aaron Morrisette is awaiting trial.

The Major Crimes Unit was activated for homicide investigations on two occasions in 2016. On June 10, 2016, MCU responded for the homicide of Ramon Rollins at 1000 North Martin Luther King Boulevard. A suspect was identified in this homicide and the investigative file was forwarded to the District Attorney's Office in December 2016 for action. We are awaiting a decision from the District Attorney to form a Grand Jury or to request an arrest warrant for the suspect. On October 18, 2016, MCU responded to 1801 East Howard Street in reference to the homicide of Jimmy Stotts. A suspect identified as Ricky Goodman was identified and taken into custody. We are awaiting trial for this homicide.

SPECIAL OPERATIONS

The Major Crimes Unit was also activated for an aggravated battery on a police officer. On Monday, August 29, 2016, at about 11:37 p.m., Officer Caron of the Clovis Police Department was patrolling the area of the 900 block of Wallace Street in Clovis, New Mexico, when he conducted a traffic stop of a bicycle for a minor traffic offense. Officer Caron made contact with the rider of the bicycle who was identified as Anthony Baca (34 years of age). A warrant check was run on Baca and Clovis Police Department Dispatched relayed Baca had an outstanding felony arrest warrant for failure to appear in court for his person. Officer Caron told Baca he was under arrest and as he attempted to handcuff Baca, Baca resisted Officer Caron's attempt to arrest him and fled on foot. Officer Caron gave chase and informed dispatch he was in a foot pursuit. During the chase, Baca attempted to scale a fence. Officer Caron ordered Baca to stop and deployed his Taser ECD in effort to gain control of Baca. Baca was not incapacitated by the Taser. Officer Caron stated Baca raised his right arm, he heard a loud bang, saw the muzzle flash from a firearm and immediately felt a burning sensation in his left thigh. Officer Caron went to the ground and was able to draw his pistol, but by this time Baca had fled the scene. Officer Caron radioed dispatch relaying a "shots fired" call. On Wednesday, August 31, 2016, at about 5:10 p.m., Officers of the Clovis Police Department were dispatched to the 900 block of Mitchell Street, Lindsey Law Office. Anthony Baca was taken into custody without incident. His case is awaiting trial.

In 2016, Detectives were assigned 425 cases (418 in 2015). Of the 425 assigned cases, Detectives cleared 278 cases (65.6%). The clearance is based on Arrests, Warrants for arrest, cases that were Exceptionally Cleared, and cases that were Unfounded. This total does not include the Inactive cases (97), or the Active cases (60).

There were 627 Burglary Reports taken in 2016 by Patrol, which is -13% less than the 725 reported in 2015. Of those 627 Burglary Reports, 69 Burglary Cases were assigned to the Detective Division from January 2016 through December 2016.

RECORDS UNIT

Records Unit:

The Records Division had a busy year. Throughout the year, the Records Section struggled with manning. By the end of 2016, Records was fully manned and offering assistance to Evidence Technician Blair. Selected members of the Records Section are assisting ET Blair in identifying items for destruction.

Records generated \$20,849.50 in revenue for 2016, a \$2,844.40 increase compared to 2015. Records entered 490 incident reports (557 in 2015), 1,729 crash reports (1,341 in 2015), 7,639 citations (10,039 in 2015), and 2219 supplemental reports (1028 in 2015) for entry into the CAPERS Records Management System Database for 2016. The Records Unit acted on 15,907 requests for services during this past year, which is up 10%.

REGION V DRUG TASK FORCE

Narcotics Unit:

The Region V Drug Task Force (R5DTF) Agents worked confidential informants to develop search warrants and arrests in Eastern New Mexico in 2015. Agents have been working cases with other Agents in Curry County, Roosevelt County, Tatum, and Portales. Sgt. R. Aguilar was reassigned to Patrol in 2016. MPO Calbert was assigned as an Agent and Sgt. L. Riddle was assigned as supervisor for R5DTF in 2016.

Throughout this year, Drug Task Force (DTF) manning has been in limbo. Agent Lara (CCSO), retired for another job, and has not yet been replaced. The only agency assisting with manning has been the Portales Police Department. In 2016, the Association of Counties reacted to litigation to a lawsuit against a County entity in the central corridor of New Mexico. Following this litigation, Sheriff's Offices minimized their issuing of commissions, as directed by the Association of Counties. Memorandums of Agreement in reference to commissioning of Officers, bypassing utilization of Sheriffs because of the litigation, have been emplaced with Santa Rosa Police Department and Portales Police Department.

In 2016, R5DTF overtime also conducted 43 street operations resulting in 195 traffic stops, with 135 traffic and misdemeanor citations issued, seizing 17 gg of controlled substances. Though the seizures were minimal, the physical presence and directed engagement of targeted areas created an atmosphere where the citizenry were able to see Officers in action, as opposed to the typical use of Agents working quietly in the background.

Also in 2016, R5DTF sponsored prescription drug take back programs on two occasions. Agents and Officers directed by the Agents also engaged in four briefings involving 161 participants. R5DTF understands it is not only the pressure of operations on drug traffickers that makes a difference. Educating the public we serve may stop a young person from experimentation with controlled substances, help families recognize the signs of the use of these substances in their loved ones so they can intervene, and may even assist us during the prosecution phases of various cases.

SWAT

There were three SWAT activations for the Year 2016.

May 10th 2016 16-02813 Anthony Perez 1000 MLK APT 108

On 05-10-2016 SWAT Members were activated to respond to 1000 MLK Apt 108 to serve a felony warrant on Anthony Perez who was located inside of his apartment. Anthony was talked into turning himself in peacefully. He was detained inside his apartment by officers then escorted to a transport vehicle for detention. During INC# 16-02813 no lethal or non-lethal munitions were used.

June 6th 2016 16-03437 Aaron Morrisette 503 E 16th

June 6, 2016, patrol officers located Aaron Morrisette at an address 503 E 16th Street. Aaron was wanted for an aggravated battery where he was suspected of stabbing his ex-girlfriend multiple times before stealing her car and eluding police. After attempts with negotiations failed the residence was gassed in the attempt to lure him from the residence. When the gas plan was unsuccessful the team was granted permission to enter the residence and take Aaron into custody by Chief of Police D. Ford. When Aaron was located in the back NE bedroom he was detained without further incident. The non-lethal rounds used on this callout after three volleys of fire included the following list.

On June 16, 2016 patrol officers received information Manuel Duran was inside the residence of 1220 Ash where he and his son are known to live. When patrol got the confirmation Manuel was in fact inside the home, the SWAT team was activated due to Manuel's violent history and he was suspected to have stolen a loaded firearm from a vehicle he had taken a week prior. Once the team was on scene negotiations were started to lure Manuel from the home. Once the negotiations were unsuccessful the team breached the front door of the home. After the door was breached Manuel voluntarily came out of the residence and was taken into custody without incident. During INC# 16-03658 no lethal or non-lethal munitions were used.

In 2016 the team held testing for the team obtaining five new members Padilla, Sandoval, Bonner, Todd and F. Hernandez.

With the support of leadership SWAT was provided the opportunity to advance training for the team getting Basic SWAT certification for five members in Carlsbad. In October Gurule and Aguilar attended advance SWAT in Los Lunas. Since receiving training the team has focused scheduling monthly trainings to develop and grow skills and knowledge for better preparation.

The team has established an with SOS to utilize Melrose Air Force Range for training and built great relationships with ARMY Special Forces and USAF DAGGRE for better training opportunities and the use of their facilities.

During the past year the team has experienced lots of growth with CPT Dial and CPT Romero being promoted and the addition of new team members. The team has also had two longtime team members resign which consisted of Brandon Floyd and Jake Wittaker.

Clovis Police Department was granted founding from the Home Land Security Grant for SWAT equipment which awarded the team \$60,000 to purchases needed tools.

SWAT Sniper Element

During 2016 the Clovis Police Department Sniper Team began to consistently train together as a team, rather than just individuals assigned to rifles. Although the team tried to meet monthly to conduct training scenarios and qualifications the team could not meet every month for various reasons. Each Sniper was still required to conduct cold bore deviation rounds at least two times per month and document the number of precision rounds being fired.

SWAT

During the month of May the Clovis Police Department completed a purchase of two new sniper rifles. These rifles were purchased as a complete set from Silencer Tech LLC. based in Logan, New Mexico. The rifles were built with optics, rifle bag and noise suppression included.

These two AR-10 .308 rifles were built to specifications determined by the Clovis Police Department Sniper Unit.

Each rifle was acquired as a complete package to include Night Force Optics, carbon fiber wrapped barrel for reduction in weight and extended barrel life, and carry case.

On June 7, 2016 Sgt. Thron was deployed to provide over watch for a barricaded subject call at 509 E. 16th Street.

On June 18, 2016 Lt. Telles was deployed to provide over watch for a barricaded wanted subject at 1220 Ash Street.

PROPERTY/EVIDENCE UNIT

The Property and Evidence Unit continues to be operated with great efficiency by Mr. Wendell Blair. The total number of physical property type items received into evidence in 2016 was 4,882, which is a 29% increase from 2015's total. An additional 7,120 pieces of digital evidence was entered into the DIMS system, a 25% increase from 2015. Throughout the year, the Evidence Unit transitioned 22,652 pieces of evidence to the courts, labs, storage, and to individuals. This is a 33% increase from last year's total of 16,981. The Evidence Unit destroyed 1,623 items through court orders in 2016, a 7% decrease from last year's total of 1,746 items. 208 items were transferred to its owners and 2 items were transferred to other agencies in 2016.

There were some significant events for Property and Evidence in 2016. To assist ET Blair in his duties, a G1 tablet was issued to him to help conduct evidence inventory. In May 2016, we realized our DIMS system was nearing its maximum capacity. We conducted purges but freed up only a small amount of space for storage of digital files. The system's use was minimized and the Department began an older process of placing digital evidence onto CD/DVD's. With the necessity of video in most every case, we are at a crossroads and must invest in a larger amount of storage.

PROFESSIONAL STANDARDS UNIT

The Professional Standards Unit is responsible for the internal affairs, staff inspection and training and recruiting functions within the Clovis Police Department.

The Internal Affairs Section conducts and coordinates the investigations of allegations of misconduct on the part of Department employees. During 2016, five (5) internal investigations were processed.

The Staff Inspection Section conducts inspections of all organizational components within the Department, ensuring compliance with New Mexico State Chiefs of Police Association Accreditation and Department policies and procedures. There were a total of four (4) quarterly random inspections of the Property/Evidence room. The unit also conducted an annual 100% audit of the firearms, narcotics, money and jewelry secured in the property/evidence room. During all inspections/audits, no discrepancies were noted.

In 2016, the Recruitment Unit conducted the required testing and background processes for a total of seventeen (17) personnel. We hired nine (9) new police officers, two (2) animal control officers, one (1) records clerk and five (5) telecommunicators.

The Training Unit conducted a forty-hour (40) hour annual in-house training program to meet the biennium training requirements set forth by the New Mexico Department of Public Safety. The department also is providing additional training through the use of a web-based software called the V-Academy. The officers and staff completed a minimum of eight (8) on-line courses concerning a variety of different courses.

The unit hosted a Field Evidence Technical School, which qualified six (6) Clovis Police Officers as Field Evidence Technicians.
